Welcome to the July edition of the WM. The early part of June was fairly dry and mostly warm and then we had a scorching!!

Lodge Farm

Just four days before the full council meeting the updated traffic assessment appeared (150+ pages) supposedly a Rugby Wide study. Notably it doesn't cover anywhere west of the A45!!! and only one map of many shows Willoughby at all.

On the 21st June many of us braved the heat to go to the Benn Hall to listen to the Full Council consider whether to submit the draft Local Plan to the Government, the last stage before it gets adopted. A couple of days before the meeting it emerged that our Councillor, Emma Crane, would be allowed to move an amendment to remove Lodge Farm from the plan. Sadly however, councillors voted 20-18 against the amendment. They then voted in favour of the plan being submitted.

The debate was a fairly depressing affair with a number of speakers having read the representations made to them and being convinced that Lodge Farm should be removed. Offset by a number of die-hard 'the developers are itching to force development where we don't want it therefore we need a plan' (any plan it seemed). They repeated that they can't build on green belt so Lodge Farm is ok. All this against the startling acceptance that the plan includes substantially more houses than necessary to meet the required numbers and extra for contingency. The draft plan itself and its predecessors say that building in open countryside can only be permitted in exceptional circumstances.

So despite everyone else, from MP's to Coventry City Council and the Local Enterprise partnership, saying Lodge Farm is wrong it remains in the draft plan. SALFV will now have to consider whether to launch a legal challenge (the substantial over provision means there is no exceptional need therefore the plan contradicts itself) and representation at the public examination of the plan by the Government's planning inspector. Either or both will be costly so please support their fund raising if you want to see Lodge Farm removed it is not yet a done deal just a bit more difficult and costly.

Parish Plan & Design Statement or Neighbourhood Plan ?

You should have received a survey from the Parish Council asking whether you would like there to be a Neighbourhood Plan for Willoughby. The following, extracted from the CPRE web site, gives an overview of what they are and their relative merits.

Parish Plans & Village Design Statements are non-statutory neighbourhood planning tools so the main difference to consider is that they will carry less weight in the decision-making process than a formally adopted Neighbourhood Plan.

An advantage of a non-statutory neighbourhood planning tool is that their scope does not have to be limited to matters covered by planning law. So it could, for example, cover social issues or activities as part of the vision for your local area. Such documents may also help form part of the evidence base on which a Neighbourhood Plan can be developed.

The RBC draft Local Plan refers to these as follows:

Policy GP5: Parish or Neighbourhood level documents

Where the views of a community are expressed in a Parish or Neighbourhood Plan (or equivalent), they will be taken into account in the planning system. For the views of a community to be considered, the Parish or Neighbourhood Plan will need to:

- Have been endorsed by Rugby Borough Council;
- Be in conformity with national policy; and
- Be regularly reviewed and updated if necessary

The use of Parish or Neighbourhood Plans will principally inform:

- The determination of a planning application;
- The requirement and scope of development contributions associated with a planning permission; and
- The assessment of schemes in the context of a need identified through the Parish or Neighbourhood Plan

On the face of it in regard to RBC's use of either type of plan there is little difference.

You may view a copy of the current village plan on the Parish Council's web site along with the last published update dated May 2015. This plan was based upon a survey carried out in 2012. Perhaps the plan and design statement fully reviewed and updated would be sufficient for our village.

Anybody registered to vote in local elections is entitled to express their opinion.
