Willoughby Parish Council

Although there have been some small changes to what you can do during the Covid 19'epidemic it is vital that we continue to observe the Government guide lines. Enjoy the sunshine and stay safe. Your Parish Council will not be holding any meetings until we are advised it is safe to do so. If you

Police & Neighbourhood Watch

The range of scams gets ever larger and can be via email, a doorstep caller, or a telephone caller. A common feature is all are slick tongued persuasive individuals with only one aim that is to part you from your money. They don't care if they leave you penniless. Do not buy anything from a doorstep trader, do not give any personal or financial information to anyone you are not certain is genuine. Legitimate organisations and businesses will not ask you for sensitive information like account, card and pin numbers.

Currently many scams are linked in some way to the corona virus including selling PPE/masks and test kits that are either ineffective or don't arrive.

Also on offer are 5g neutralising devices that appear to be no more than a low capacity USB memory stick with a label – no research has shown 5g signals to be dangerous. The devices are sold at up to \pounds 300....the USB memory sticks sell for \pounds 5.

YOU can't be too careful!!

Crime prevention: Property marking is a deterrent to burglars and increases the likelihood of stolen items being recovered. Rachel has the Village property marking kit and can mark items. Contact her (see below) to arrange to take smaller items to her or a home visit, in the village, to mark larger items.
