This activity also posed a potential fire risk. We have decided not to attach photographs of the damage as one piece might be offensive and the other contains the names of persons who may not be involved. The Council will now have to use some of its limited resources to have the wood sanded down and the walls re varnished.

Flood Action Group (FLAG)

On 2 January, Main Street and Lower Street flooded as the brook could no longer cope with the volume of water from the sustained and, sometimes, heavy rainfall. Volunteer flood wardens spent hours, in the cold and rain, engaging with drivers at the three entrances to the village, asking them to turn around or, at least, to drive slowly through the village so that water was not thrown up against houses and onto gardens.
