# January 2018

About 50-60 lapwings seen near Carter's field.

Long Tailed Tits have been seen doing the rounds of garden bird-feeders.

There seem to be fewer starlings about though they can be seen in Daventry.

Tawny Owls were heard during the night.

A Brown Hare was seen near Woolscott Lane.

Large numbers (maybe 40) Canada Geese have been flying low in their V shape.

On 31st January there was a blue moon -also a super moon, which could be clearly seen over Willoughby.

## February and March 2018

There have been some cold, frosty days as well as weekends of snow in February and early March.

During the snow at the end of February Redwings were seen in several gardens. They are thought to have come from a flock of about 24 seen near Ashlawn Road, Rugby.

Spike, Bob O'Donnell's Hedgehog is hibernating but seems well.

A Duck laid 2 eggs into Bert Ogle's pond!

As well as the usual garden birds, Green Woodpeckers have been seen, Buzzards, a Heron, a hen and a cock Pheasant in different gardens, and a Blackcap.

Betty Oates saw 2 Hares in the field behind her home.

There are Badger setts at Haywards Lodge and beside the A45 and Woolscott Lane.

Some warmer days have brought out Brimstone butterflies and bees.

The British Trust for Ornithology have a Garden Bird Watch over the Easter weekend.

A few Hedgehog sightings around Easter.

## <u>April 2018</u>

In the middle of April there was some warm, even hot weather, but the month is ending with cooler temperatures and April showers. The warmth, and the rain that preceded it, brought plants into rapid growth and the trees quickly showed leaves and blossom as if to catch up with the cold winter.

Sadly a Badger carcass was found near Haywards Lodge, however Badgers appear to be active in Longdown Lane.

Leonie Tromans has managed to persuade a rabbit to move to the other side of the allotment boundary by digging its burrow.

Butterflies seen this month are Brimstones, Tortoiseshell, Peacock and Orange -tip

Lots of small butterflies e.g. Cabbage whites (but fewer Peacocks), dragon flies, ladybirds.

Small Copper butterfly at Jays. They are in decline. The larva feed on sorrel.

### October 2018

Small birds coming to bird feeders:

Goldfinches Great tits Blue tits

Larger birds:

Buzzards Sparrowhawk Magpies and a Swan was seen flying towards Daventry possibly from the canal.

Hedgehog (before the cold snap) A solitary Badger
