Take Notice, that under the provisions of the Public Health Act, 1875,

the (b) *Rural Sanitary Authority of the Rugby Union*

being satisfied of the existence of a Nuisance at (c) *your premises*
situate at Willoughby, and occupied by
William Sargeant

arising from (d) *the roof of the house being*
so dilapidated and the house so filthy as to
be a nuisance or injurious to health

do hereby require you within *Fourteen days* from the
service of this Notice to abate the same, and for that purpose to (e) *have*
the roof repaired and the house cleansed.

If you make default in complying with the requisitions of this Notice, or if the said Nuisance, though abated, is likely to recur, a Summons will be issued requiring your attendance to answer a complaint which will be made to a Court of Summary Jurisdiction for enforcing the abatement of the Nuisance, and prohibiting a recurrence thereof and for recovering the costs and penalties that may be incurred thereby.

(d) Describe the cause of nuisance, for instance, want of a privy or drain; or a ditch or drain so foul as to be a nuisance or injurious to health; or swine kept so as to be a nuisance or injurious to health, &c.
(e) State any things required to be done or works to be executed.
