The Willoughby Parish Council called a General Meeting on Thursday, 27th January, 1977, in the Village Hall

The Agenda was "Our Queen's Silver Jubilee Year 1977 and what our village was going to do by way of special celebrations"

The Clerk to the Council read out correspondence already received by the Parish Council dated September and October, 1976, concerning County and Town activities toward raising cash.

The meeting decided that these letters were not relevant to our Village's efforts and consequently the Chairman (K Gealy) called for nominations for the Willoughby Silver Jubilee Committee

The village organisations were asked to nominate a person or persons to serve on the Committee, but nominated from the meeting were Mr. Jim Walton, Mr Alan Jones and Mrs Audrey Mitchell

The Cricket Club had already nominated their Secretary, Mr. Fred Mitchell to serve and the Parish Council nominated Mrs Vanessa Cuthbert. Following their respective Committee Meetings the organisations further nominated:-

It was further agreed that the inaugural meeting of the new Committee be on Monday, 14th February, 1977, at 8pm. in the Village Hall

The first meeting was duly attended; Mr Fred Mitchell was elected Chairman, Mrs Audrey Mitchell elected Secretary and Mrs Betty Jones elected Treasurer

It was agreed that the Programme of Events would commence on Saturday, 28th May, 1977, and proceed to Jubilee Day - Tuesday 7th June, 1977

In order to finance the principal events the Committee decided to organise a Jumble Sale on Saturday, 4th March, 19770

A circular was prepared to advertise the Jumble Sale and to inform the village of the progress made toward organising the celebrations.

The Committee members were allocated a set number of houses to visit so that during the period immediately prior to the celebrations the village could be circulated quickly.

Following the village circular which was distributed by Committee members, the Jumble was collected and assembled at the Hall on Friday evening, 4th March, and Saturday morning, 5th March.

A large variety of items were on sale - household items, clothes, hats, shoes etc., the larger items had been collected on a sale or return basis.

Committee members and their respective wives or husbands manned the stalls, the prices being largely "open to offer" sales were not especially difficult to make.

Refreshments were on sale for the buyers who came in their dozens from quite a few outlying areas.

The sale overall was a success - the Treasurer announced an event profit of £57.01 which included £5.20 from Tranter's of Rugby who collected the residue of goods from the Village Hall during the following week.

Fund Raising - Numbers limited to 80 - Harvest Supper served at 8.30 p.m. to commence the evening.

Catering by the Committee ladies and helpers, Mrs. Jackie Gibbard was in charge of arrangements.

The Country dancing, music by records, the Caller Mr Robin Spicer, commenced at 9.15 p.m.. Very few of the people present had been to a Country Dance before and it was especially pleasing to note that the ladies and gentlemen who were more experienced at this form of dancing encouraged the non-participants to "have-a-go" and after a very short time everyone was joining in the dancing to the absolute limit of some people's endurance.

Some 10 children attended which for them was a wonderful introduction to dancing proper - the expertise of Mr. Robin Spicer as Caller was evident from the start and even with the additional problem of no microphone (which was found to be broken at the beginning of the evening) he performed admirably and was congratulated by the Chairman of the Jubilee Committee at the end of the evening.

The variety of dances was endless, the appeal was universal from the "Country Girl" on the one hand to the "Red River Girl" on the other.

The operation of a Country Dance depends largely on the participation of all people attending and to this end the dancers of Willoughby excelled, not only for performing "well into the night", but for supporting what was for most of them a "first-time" event.

A number of his specialist singing spots had a Jubilee or Royalist theme and got our programme of events off to a flying start The Bar was organised and run by Tony Adkins.

A Prize Draw for a bottle of Whisky raised £27002. 3rd an event profit of £29.52 was announced.

Prior to the event the Jubilee Committee had completely decorated the interior of the Hall with streamers, Balloons and Union Jacks for the 10 days or events to follow.

An excellent innings of 15 by Bill Hall and a praiseworthy 10 by Arthur Hatwell ensured a reasonable total of 69-12 for the Sidney Ivens team.

In reply the Jackie Gibbard team recorded 71-8 with John Midwood being 36 not out completely dominating the innings.

The ladies had prepared refreshments of Bread, Cheese, Pickle Onions, Black Pudding etc. the cost of which was defrayed by a collecting box operated on the night by Jim Walton.

The entire social event in the Pavilion after the match was attended by some 80 - 90 people and was an outstanding social success.

All the players who were conned into making an appearance had long since 'retired' from the game. The dress for the occasion was shorts and pumps which added to the attraction for the 100 spectators who turned up to witness the events of the night.

Jim Walton and Jim Howkins had marked out half-a-full-size Soccer Pitch and erected the appropriate size Goal Posts. The weather was right for football - cool, sunny and a light wind.

After the spectators had finished laughing at the sights which met their eyes, the tournament finally got under way with Team (1) v Team (2).

From the kick-off it was evident that stamina was going to be supreme on the night, grown men "rushing" all of 15 yards after the ball only to be upended within kicking distance of it! and taking a considerable time to pick themselves up before taking any further part, was funny to watch but very energy consuming. Indeed after 10 minutes there were some 'grey' faces sucking in oxygen as if it were their last!

Dennis Neville the Tournament Referee kept a close control over the match - without bias - even if some of the over-zealous tackling was technically a bookable offence. During the match Mr. Neville had occasion to show the 'yellow' card with a further threat of the 'red' card following an off-the-ball incident concerning Bill Shilton and Frank Hallam, this had been brought to his attention by the self-styled senior linesman Neal Hallam.

other incidents were too numerous to mention in this report, but many of the injuries received were very evident some 10 days afterwards.

Team (2) beat Team (1) 1 - 0 and Team (3) beat Team (4) 1 - 0 In the final between Team (2) and Team (3) there was no score at full time but Team (3) won the tournament on penalties"

Following the event most participants returned to the Cricket Pavilion for yet another social evening attended by some 50 people, the ladies again providing the usual refreshments.

A varied programme of acts had been prepared by the Ryton Ladies who did not charge for their services although the Jubilee Committee agreed to pay their entire travelling expenses amounting to £14,00.

The programme ranged from selections from 'My Fair Lady' monologues - a solo tap-dancing performance - Spanish dancing and the evening's entertainment was brought to a close with the Ryton Ladies tribute to Jubilee Year consisting of famous folk songs of the four home countries.

During the interval Coffee, Orange Juice and biscuits were served at 5p per head by the Jubilee Committee.

BARBECUE & SUGAR & SPICE DISCO

Barbecue served at 9.30 p.m. to 110 people

Menu: Lamb Chop - Sausages - Onions Salad with Roll & Butter - Coffee.

A large canvas awning was erected by Alan Jones with assistance from Joe Bussey on the east side of the Hall and within this, the cooking facility was 'set-up'. The Lamb Chops were pre-cooked during the day and conveyed to the Hall where they were placed in dixies surrounded by boiling water.

The sausages were grilled on open trays over a Charcoal fire which provided the right atmosphere for 'open-air' serving. The Head Cook was Alan Jones with assistance from his staff of Joe Bussey, John Midwood and Jim Walton. One mishap - a sausage literally fell out of the frying pan into the fire much to the amusement of the onlookers and consternation of the Head Cook.

At the appointed hour of 9.30 p.m. the customers filed from the Hall (kitchen exit) and on production of half the entrance ticket were equipped with plate, knife and fork and filed past the serving counter to collect Roll and Butter, Salad, Lamb Chop and finally sausage direct from the Cooking Tray - together with the usual condiments which was consumed in the Village Hall on a variety of "Tables".

The entire serving operation took 20 minutes, and was most efficiently carried out even to the serving of Cups of Coffee after everyone (including staff) had been served.

Washing up was attended to by the Committee ladies and Mrs. Midwood.

The Sugar and Spice Disco provided the music for dancing and by a careful blending operation by Paul Midwood (Joint Partner) managed to satisfy most people's musical tastes.

A most enjoyable evening eagerly awaited by all and was undoubtedly one of the successes of the week.

The evening was rounded off by the ceremonial playing (conducted by Paul Midwood) of the National Anthem which again brought to everyone's notice the purpose for which we were all celebrating.

The canvass awnings were dismantled post-haste to beat oncoming showers, Jim Howkins showing considerable promise as a "patrol leader" in assisting Jim Walton in tying guy ropes.

A somewhat surprising event profit of £99.30 was announced, this being mainly due to the Committee's insistence of pricing the Barbecue at a reasonable figure without giving the tickets away. This theory was borne out by the fact that the event was a complete sell-out some 3 weeks before.

The Presidents X1 batting first made an excellent start, Graham Burton (Courtaulds, Nuneaton) and Kevin Wits (Flecknoe) putting on 75 for the first wicket and building on this steady start batted on for 52 overs making 198 for 7 wickets. Kevin Wits 92 Tony Adkins 43 not out Graham Burton 35

Willoughby openers Les Kemp and Phil Allibone were both out at 22 and it was left to Gil Ivens and Peter Stone to salvage a difficult position and at 96 for 5 the game was swinging the Presidents way but some determined batting by the middle order saw Willoughby to a creditable draw 142 for 9 from 47 overs.

A canvas awning, kindly loaned by Kim Gibbard, was erected next to the cricket club outbuildings to house the sideshows planned for the day.

During the rather miserable afternoon the Silver Jubilee Committee attempted to operate the dozen or so sideshows and a very creditable £14.41 was taken for Committee funds, had the weather favoured us this figure could very well have reached £50.

A special word of thanks must go to the Cricket Club and all those ladies and gentlemen who assisted with the assembling of sideshows and awnings.

TUESDAY, 7TH JUNE, 1977.

JUBILEE DAY

Preparations for the big day had been under way for many weeks, but unfortunately as the 7th of June dawned, overcast skies prevailed and eventually heavy showers precluded the Committees preparations for the afternoons events. Not to be deterred the Committee and their many helpers began the task of preparation, with particular attention to the layout in the Schoolroom.

The Playing Field being the main stage of events was duly marked out for the Sports events - 50 yds. by 8 lanes (Olympic style) by Jim Howkins and the Chairman. Decorations and bunting were erected by Alan Jones.

The Arts and Crafts Exhibition was prepared by Mrs. Hilda Martin and her helpers using the display stands and covers etc. loaned by the Women's Institute. Many people displayed their talents for the remainder of the Village to view and the resultant display was magnificent. To we of lesser ability this part of our Jubilee Day only served to prove the point that one needs to !El to succeed. The Exhibition was obviously "Jubilee" but the over-riding effect when one entered the Schoolroom was of beauty - from the Model Engines to Art in all its forms - Paintings, Jewellery, Needlework, Upholstery etc. An element of surprise was expressed by many visitors who could not believe the wide range of hobbies shown and the quality of all the exhibits.

In conjunction with the Exhibition a Prize Draw was held for 2 Paintings very kindly donated by Mrs. Clarke of Magdalan Road, which raised £14.50 to the Jubilee Fund. The pictures were won by Mr. R. Yates (a visitor during Jubilee week) and re-donated and won by Mrs. B. Nurser of Braunston.

The afternoons events were commenced with the ceremony of Crowning the Jubilee Queen - Debbie Sutherland - who had been chosen from among the school-children along with her attendant - Simon Gibbard - and from among the "hand-maidens" Donna Truslove read out the Crowning Speech whilst officially Crowning the Queen after which the entourage processed around the village School play-ground.

The Maypole Dancing, which has been an annual feature at our School for many years, then took place - given by the local children of the village who had been previously rehearsed by Mrs. B. Green, Headmistress. Music and final supervision was carried out by Mrs. F. Ivens and Mrs. G. Rowe.

After a hasty change of dress for many of the children some 33 entrants then took part in the Fancy Dress parade which was judged by Dr. and Mrs. Pygott and Mr. & Mrs. L. F. Mitchell.

The variety of costumes showed that a lot of time and effort had gone into the preparation for this event and the successful entrants were Leyton Truslove as Robin Hood and Joanne Cox as an Hawain Girlo Runners-up were Neil Jones as a Lifeguard. Tracy Ogle as a Jubilee Dancer, Alison Tanser as "Trouble in China" and Alison Skinner as "Mary, Mary, Quite Contrary".

Following the Fancy Dress Parade everyone was invited to the Playing Field for the Children's Sports.

- 6). Egg & Spoon Race

At the conclusion of the Heats and prior to the respective Finals, His Worship the Mayor of Rugby, Councillor Gordon Collett and Mrs. Collett, arrived to pay an official visit to Willoughby.

After a welcoming speech by the Chairman, Fred Mitchell, the Mayor and Mayoress were asked to start the Finals and present the respective prizes - Writing Pads, donated by Mr. T. Fletcher, Sweets and Lollipops.

Following the sports the children lined up - youngest in front to be led by the Chairman to the Village Hall for the Jubilee Tea splendidly prepared by members of the Women's Institute, the tables all being decorated for the Jubilee. Some 80 children under the age of 16 sat down to tea supervised by the ladies.

Meanwhile - Adult sports were under way at the Playing Field led off by a Wellie-Wanging Competition, among the many contestants being the Mayor of Rugby, complete with Chain-of-Office. The best throws - apart from one notable effort which almost demolished the kitchen window of the Rose Inn - were -
