Secretary's report to be given at the Annual General Meeting to be held on Wednesday, November 28th 1979 at 7.30 p.m. in the Village Hall.

I present this Report of the Society's activities during 1979 with a certain amount of trepidation. It has been a demanding task to try and keep up with the high standards set by previous holders of this office. However, for better or for worse, here goes.
